LASALLE HIGH SCHOOL OPENS AS PLANNED WITH THREE PARTS UNDER CONSTRUCTION

LaSalle High School began the 1965-66 school year with a number of additions to the traditional three Rs--reading, 'riting, and 'rithmetic. S for sawing, P for pounding, and R for rasping have been added to the curriculum, and will remain for several months while skilled construction workers complete the gym, auditorium and natatorium.

In the classroom and mechanical wing the whirring, buzzing and screeching of power tools indicated that finishing touches were being made as workmen installed everything from ceiling

tile to pencil sharpeners.

Dedication of the school has been set for May 1, and at that time the completed building will have 176,634 square feet. Nearly 3.5 million dollars have been invested in this new school located in the northwestern section of South Bend. Besides 26 academic classrooms and six material centers, there are shops and industrial arts rooms.

Four commercial rooms, science laboratories with preparations centers and offices, three home economics rooms and three music rooms will also be available.

Two art rooms and two offices for the school newspaper and yearbook are included as well as the following: audio-visual laboratory, boiler room, book store, language laboratory, laundry, library, receiving room, study hall, teachers' lounge and the administrative suite. In this suite are waiting rooms, offices, conference rooms, mail rooms, guidance offices, vaults, rooms for records and the health center.

The auditorium will seat 1,000 students and will have a stage, dressing rooms, orchestra pit and disappearing risers.

In the cafeteria area over 300 students can eat at one time. The kitchen and faculty dining area adjoin the lunchroom. When the gym is completed, it will have a spectator capacity of 2,328. Also available will be dressing rooms for both boys and girls, and for the varsity teams.

Although there will be no spectator area in the natatorium, there will be six 7-foot lanes that will be 75 feet long.

LaSalle's twin, the Andrew Jackson High School (located on Miami Road in the southeast section of the city) is suffering the same growing pains.

LIBRARY NEEDS ASSISTANTS AND OLD MAGAZINES

Miss Larson, our librarian, needs your help. Although the library will have nearly 60 different periodicals to be delivered beginning this month, there will be no back issues available. Students who volunteer for library work will be lending assistance to Miss Larson, and will also be learning how the library functions.

STUDENTS RIDE SPECIAL BUSES

With the opening of the new LaSalle High School, the bus company is here to serve us again. There will be both city and township buses before and after school. The regular student bus fare is 20¢.

The routes of the city buses are as follows:

At 7:35 A.M. one city bus will make its first stop on the corner of Portage and Kinyon continuing the route to Woodlawn, Hollywood, Lathrop, Inglewood, Oakwood, Portage, Wilber, Elwood, and then to LaSalle High School.

There will be two buses from Portage Township, two buses from Warren Township, and three buses from German Township.

DANGER!

Construction - Men Working!

It's time to hit the books again. But our school is different. It isn't completely constructed. The chance of accidents is greatly increased by this fact. This presents a problem to the faculty and to us. Everyone will have to abide by certain rules if he plans to be here to see the completed building.

Certain parts of the building will be off limits to everyone. These areas are the locker rooms, auditorium, swimming pool, and gymnasium. The latter two are especially dangerous zones because of the excavation and equipment which is still in use. You will not only be doing the construction workers a favor by staying out of their way, but you will also be preventing ANY possible accidents that could occur.

The above areas are by no means the only danger zones. The most popular are the halls. When that lovely bell rings for class to dismiss, hundreds of kids come pouring out of nowhere and in 30 seconds you have mass pandemonium. Keep The School NEW

For twenty-eight long years, an overgrown, vacant lot on the corner of Elwood and Meade Streets has laid dormant. Today, this lot is no longer vacant and useless, but is instead the proud site of a glittering new high school. LaSalle is something for every student to be proud of, but it's also a responsibility to each one of us. Any new school cannot expect to retain its "image", if it is defaced and vandalized by certain elements of the student body. LaSalle is everyone's responsibility. For instance, if you ever see any defacing or other such harm to the school, report it immediately to the office personnel. The Booster Club is what the school needs and we have it. It helps with many of the school activities. So how about getting in there and pushing it all the way!

Something not considered a club, but representing the student body is the Student Council. And in conjunction with this, another thing to remember is that the elections will be coming up in October. You should be thinking about whom you want as a representative because this is the person that will do the backing for you.

For those interested in all the sports activities, the Usher's Club is for you. You learn to fulfill the basic concept of friendship by working with others at all the student assemblies.

Later in the school year, other students might find a liking for a subject or program of interest. If you are one of these and have a teacher to serve as a sponsor for this idea, discuss it with either Mr. Nelson or his assistant, Mr. Hafner. Who knows, right there might be the beginning of another club.

FORGET THE FADS, FOLLOW THE RULES

Boys are reminded to wear shirts with collars and to keep them tucked in at all times. In other words, you'll have to get up early enough to change your pajamas. Belts must be worn with trousers that have loops. Tee shirts and sweat shirts may not be worn to class unless an outer garment is worn with them. Girls are to dress properly and conservatively for school. Tasteful hair styles should be worn, and girls should try to keep their hair as neat as possible. Remember: the lunchroom or a classroom is not the place to comb your hair or put on make-up. Though they may be convenient for jumping over-desks, culottes are not to be worn. Stay off the grass. For that matter, stay out of the mud too. With your cooperation, we can have the nicest fields of mud in the city.

Students who drive to school should not use their cars to drive around the block during the noon hour. Do not confuse cafeterias and cars; cars are a means of transportation, cafeterias are a means of procuring nourishment. Students should not hold meetings in cars during the lunch hour.



LASALLE AND NAMESAKE SCHOOL HAVE SEVERAL SIMILARITIES

What is in a name? Why name it LaSalle instead of PS 754?

The name LaSalle represents a man who enjoyed seeking adventure and truth because it brought its own reward, although at times it was difficult. LaSalle gave up close ties to another country and as a result helped to establish our own country.

Rene Robert LaSalle was born in France in 1643, but he left his native land to sail for New France (Canada) when he was just twenty-three years old.

When the Indians told him of a great river to the southwest, the Ohio, he was determined to explore it. Several years passed, and LaSalle continued to investigate the strange new territory.

He returned to France where he obtained wide powers for exploration.

After raising a fort at the mouth of the Niagara River, he built the Griffin, the first sailing vessel to appear on the Great Lakes. LaSalle continued his exploration to the fort of Lake Michigan, and sailed to the mouth of the St. Joseph River.

In 1681 -- 1682, he became the first white man to descend the Mississippi River to its mouth at the Gulf of Mexico. This new territory he named Louisiana.

As LaSalle sought for adventure in traveling lands he was unsure of, we look for adventure in knowledge and friendship of a new school.

We look to our new school as a place to find new opportunities as LaSalle looked to the challenge of the new world.

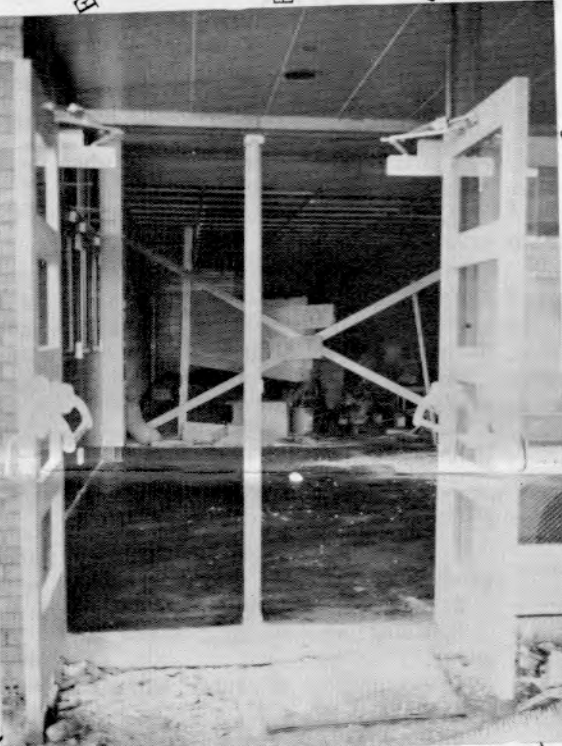
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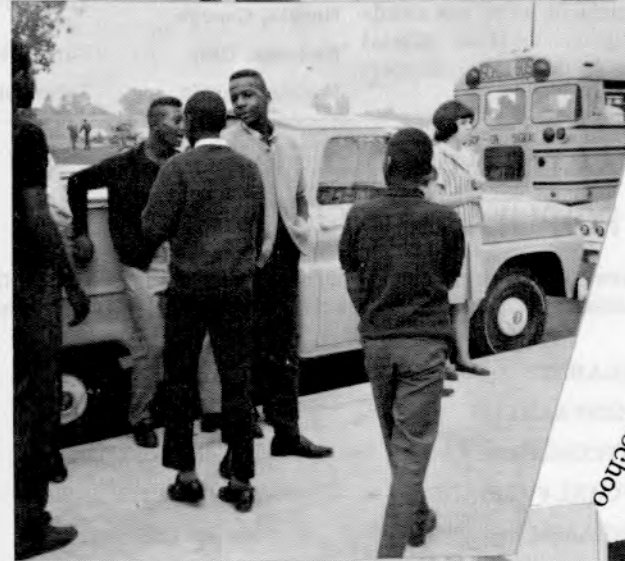
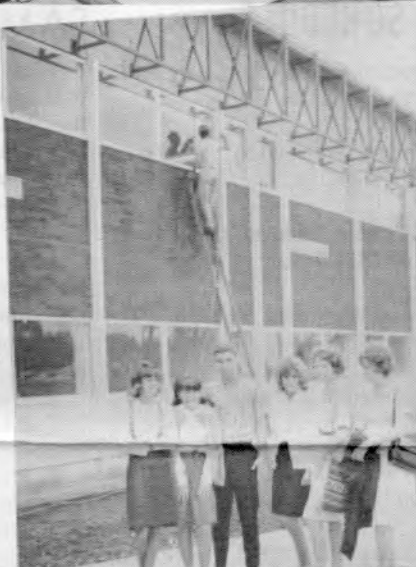


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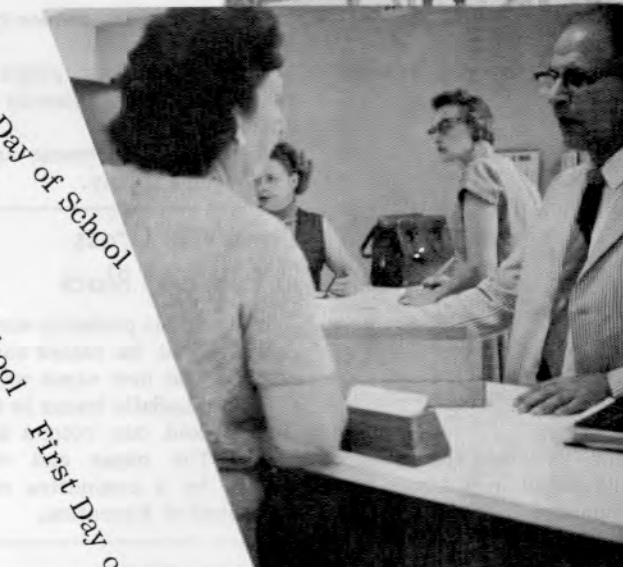
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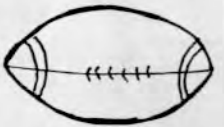


THE SIGN AT THE FRONT DOOR SAID "STAY OUT"

SPECTATORS MUST FOLLOW RULES SAME AS VARSITY TEAM MEMBERS

What are you going to wear to the ball game? If you are a member of the team, your problem is solved. Otherwise, you are expected to wear respectable and acceptable school dress--anything you would wear to class.

Is it all right to boo at the games? Read the following suggestions and you can make your own mature decision. Each student at any athletic contest should:

1. Consider his athletic opponent and officials as guests and should treat them as such.
2. Respect the rights of students from the opposing school.
3. Respect the rights of all spectators.
4. Respect the authority and judgment of the coach.
5. Respect the property of the school and the authority of school officials.
6. Cheer both teams as they come on the field of play.

7. Commend or cheer good plays by either team.
8. Cheer an injured player when he is removed from the game.
9. Support his cheerleaders wholeheartedly.
10. Accept the officials' decisions as final.
11. Show self-control at all times during and after the game.
12. Be modest in victory and gracious in defeat.

Besides these rules and suggestions listed above, there are a few suggestions to help you determine your conduct.

1. Throwing objects -- paper, candy, etc.
2. Running, shoving, wrestling, etc.
3. Using abusive or obscene language.
4. Attempting to enter without a valid ticket.
5. Walking or running on the playing field. Spectators are not permitted on the field at any time.
6. Using annoying or objectionable noisemakers.
