Dedication of the school has been set for May 1, and at that time the completed building will have 176,634 square feet. Nearly 3.5 million dollars have been invested in this new school located in the northwestern section of rooms and six material centers, there are shops and industrial arts rooms.

Editorials DANGER!

Construction - Men Working!

It's time to hit the books again. But our school is different. It isn't completely constructed. The chance of accidents is greatly increased by this fact. This presents a problem to the faculty and to us. Everyone will have to abide by certain rules if he plans to be here to see the completed building.


